


About the Book

Ideas for Storytime with Stickler Loves the World

Uncover the Cover

Show the class the cover of *Stickler Loves the World* and.

- Identify all the different creatures you see on the cover.
- What does the cover make you think of? Why?
- Describe how you see Stickler, the creature in the middle of the cover. What type of creature does Stickler remind you of? What's on top of its head?
- Do you think Stickler is real, or do you think the illustrator made a one-of-kind creature for this story?

During and After Reading

- When Stickler meets a new friend who
 has a helmet over their eyes, Stickler
 describes the world to its new friend.
 How would you describe your classroom or
 school to a new classmate? Pick three items
 or places to describe.
- Stickler is astonished everyday objects, such as the sun and the stars, even rocks! What are some ordinary things in your life that you might start seeing anew?
- Stickler says, "Let us say our favorite wishes together." As a class, identify three wishes for your school and share them with your leadership.
- Why do you think Stickler see the world in a positive and hopeful way?

Moments of Mindfulness

Arts-based learning can have a profound impact on social emotional competency—including critical thinking and empathy—while also playing a critical role in identity formation.

- Take a Listening Walk: Teach children to focus and listen carefully as you take them on a listening walk outside. Ask them what sounds they hear.
- Practice Mindful Art: Have your class collect an assortment of leaves, sticks, and rocks. Encourage kids to be creative with the items they find.
- Go On a Color Search: Create a list of ten colors found in *Stickler Loves the World*. Have students go on a walk to search for those colors in nature, trying to do this independently and quietly.
- Use Drawing Prompts: Draw your happy place. Draw your favorite creature. Draw your favorite food
